

First Reading: Deuteronomy 30:10-14 Second Reading: Colossians 1:15-20 Gospel: Luke 10:25-37

Our Gospel challenges us with the question: Who is my neighbor?

It is a question with profound implications for how we relate to and treat others in our world. As we hear the parable of the Good Samaritan, we are challenged by Christ to treat all with respect and love, especially the poor, the dispossessed, and the most vulnerable.

~ STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION ~



Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel passage from Luke, we read the well-known parable of the Good Samaritan. Here, Jesus teaches us in rich detail what stewardship in action looks like. This parable could just as accurately be called the parable of the Good Steward.

The first thing we note about the Good Samaritan is that he is aware of the needs of those around him and responds generously. While the priest and Levite brush right past the man on the side of the road, the Samaritan is attentive to those who might need help. He has a hospitable way of viewing the world around him, enabling him to "see" in a way that the others did not, and he was "moved with compassion at the sight" of the man.

Next, we see the Good Samaritan spring into action to help this man, setting aside his schedule and plans to address his needs. He doesn't just hand the man a few dollars or offer quick words of encouragement from across the road. He approaches the man directly, cleans and bandages his wounds, puts him on his animal, and takes him to an inn where he can recover. He ensures that the innkeeper will continue to care for him and commits to returning to the man on his way back.

That is how we fulfill God's commandments.

That exemplifies genuine hospitality and service.

That is how a good steward springs into action upon encountering a neighbor in need. And Jesus says to each of us, just as He did in today's Gospel, "Go and do likewise."

❖ Stewardship Reflection ❖

"Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'" Luke 10:37

This was Jesus' command at the end of the parable of the Good Samaritan. Did you know that the Samaritans and Jews had a deep-seated animosity toward each other?

The moral of the story is to love our neighbor.

This means loving someone you may not know, someone who looks different from you, or someone who has different beliefs, or even someone you don't particularly like. All of this should be done without expecting anything in return.

Pray That we may strive to be more like the Good Samaritan, helping those in need, without expecting anything in return.


> The Ignatian Examen <

A short, reflective prayer or meditation meant to be practiced daily. It's not about judgment or perfection, but about cultivating awareness, gratitude, and intention in your everyday life. The Examen helps you look back on your day to notice where you were you listening to God, where you struggled, and where you can grow. See the five steps below to be done in the evening:

- 1. **Recognize:** Begin by pausing and quieting yourself. Take a few deep breaths. Then, recall the moments of your day and thank God for your life, for anything beautiful or meaningful that happened.
- 2. **Request:** Ask for the Holy Spirit to be with you as you go through the memories of your day, to have ability to stay open and not shame yourself.
- 3. **Review:** Mentally walk through your day from beginning to end. Where did you feel joy, peace, or connection? Where did you feel off frustrated, or angry, unheard or unloved? Be attuned to your emotions-these often reveal what areas of your life need attention.
- 4. **Reconcile:** Ask God for forgiveness in where you have sinned. In mistakes, ask for healing that you may have inflicted on others. Ask the Holy Spirit for wisdom in handling these situations in the future.
- 5. **Resolve:** End by setting a simple intention. Whatever area you see need that needs work, ask for clarity, strength, or peace in facing the day ahead. Ask God to be with you in all the difficult moments and emotions the next day. What can you do the next day?
